Pastor's Corner

Change is not only inevitable, it is desirable. We say of the children in our lives, "They grow so fast! Why can't they stay little longer?" But, we would REALLY be upset if they did not grow and change and mature into adults living independent lives and making their own decisions.

Sometimes we are delighted to greet the changing seasons and the passing of each year. Sometimes it fills us with complaints or sadness. That is life.

When some things change, we wonder, "Is that good? Is that bad? Or, is it simply progress?" Many changes bring mixed messages—the advances can be used for good or for bad. Nuclear fission can be used to produce electricity, or it can be used to produce atomic bombs. The jury is still out on other advancements such as CRISPR for genetic modification and AI, or is it IT? IT is Information Technology, but the AI, Artificial Intelligence, of current Robotics far exceeds IT. The astonishing development in AI and CRISPR far exceeds our philosophical and theological development to incorporate them into our ethical and cultural systems. But they have deep ethical and practical implications for our everyday lives and the lives of every human being on our planet. And, not just our lives, but the way we see each other and even the way we see God. Just google AI and look at the IBM ads—some of them are downright frightening!

Important as all these things are, I really wanted to talk about the way the word *nice* has become a dirty word. I first encountered the idea that *nice* was a dirty word almost 20 years ago at a church workshop when a Pastor told us that the problem with Christians is that we are too nice! And I am still sitting here wondering how one can be too nice? I grew up being told "Behave yourself, be nice. That wasn't nice. If you don't have anything good to say, say nothing." Nice was good. Nice was admirable. Nice was what I strived to be. I often fell short, but I tried. Nice was what I wanted to be, to do.

But, either, the Pastor in the workshop was on to something, or he was contagious. Because, "nice" may not always be a "dirty" word, but it sure has picked up a lot of baggage over the years. Recently someone told me they were going to stop being a People Pleaser. My ears perked up, I heard, "I am going to stop being a nice person!" My heart leaped out to them, "NO, you can't do that!" Nice is good! I like you nice! What kind of a world will we have if people aren't nice to each other?"

Well, thinking about it—there are dangers and pitfalls in being a *People Pleaser* or in being *Too Nice*. If *being nice* means you sacrifice your values or your personal well being to satisfy the whims of the other person, it can be a bad thing. But if *being nice* means following the Golden Rule and *Doing unto others as you would have them do unto you,* then it is a good thing.

When Cain asks, "Am I my brother's keeper?" The answer is a resounding, "YES!" But it is a mutual responsibility and not an invitation to manipulate our brothers and sisters to suit our personal whims. Like nuclear fission, AI, and CRISPR, being nice carries some good and some bad.

May we find the good and learn to contain and minimize the bad—in all of it.


